Teams. Each team at "F" Street Church is serving a specific function that is important to fulfilling the vision of this body of believers. We desire that each team be led by a team leader who fulfills the requirements of a spiritual leader. This is where we desire everyone to be involved in helping us to be a place of acceptance and direction.

ATLAS of Lincoln: November Update

90 days old! Three months of blessings and challenges. A quarter year of existence for Atlas of Lincoln. Every day we take new steps forward, connecting with new opportunities to serve, new ministries and churches with which to partner, and new followers of Christ to equip.

A few weeks ago, I had the privilege of sitting at a booth during the Project Homeless Connect outreach event at Pinnacle Bank Arena. It was cool connecting with so many community organizations serving so many people. It was even more fun chatting with folks from across Lincoln, who were being served by the event.

One lady in particular sticks out in my mind. Her name is Lisa. She walked shyly up to our booth and asked about what Atlas does. I explained it briefly to her and she told me about her situation. Lisa and her husband live 90 minutes away, but their son Joshua lives in Lincoln. Joshua suffers from schizophrenia and has a history of violence. Lisa said that she and her husband were at a loss for how to help Joshua. She also talked about how she was afraid to go over to Joshua's apartment, but also mentioned how worried they are about their son. I offered to meet with Lisa and talk about how to proceed with Joshua. She brightened and asked how much it would cost. She was surprised when I told her Atlas services are free. I gave her my card and she said she would call.

She called me on Monday and we're scheduled to meet later this week (I'm currently writing this on Tuesday). I don't know how the meeting will go, I don't know how best to help Joshua. Maybe he just needs someone to talk to regularly. Maybe professional help is necessary. Probably both and then some. We want Joshua to get the help he needs. We want to give hope to Lisa and her husband for their son. We want to be a place to go when people like Lisa don't know where else to turn.

During our chat at the Homeless Connect event, Lisa said she didn't know why she walked into the building that day. She doesn't even live in Lincoln. For some reason, she said she just walked into Pinnacle Bank Arena that Tuesday afternoon. Praise God for the Spirit, who is alive and vibrant and moving in our community, leading folks like Lisa to us. Praise God for a meeting in which we might offer hope to Lisa and help to Joshua. Praise God for the opportunity to serve in a community with much need. While I'm nervous for the meeting as I have no idea what to do either, I'm thankful for and blessed by the chance to touch lives for Christ.

Resident Meditations

“Christ above us, Christ beneath us, // Christ beside us, Christ within us. // Invisible we see you, Christ above us. // With earthly eyes we see above us, // clouds or sunshine, grey or bright. // But with the eye of faith // we know you reign, // instinct in the sun ray, // speaking in the storm, // warming and moving all creation, // Christ above us...” - *Rev. George MacLeod*

So writes George MacLeod, a twentieth-century Scottish clergyman. MacLeod, thoughtful and unconventional, adapts the words from the prayer of the famed Irish missionary, St. Patrick. The prayer, known as “St. Patrick’s Breastplate,” describes the far-reaching expanse of God in all things. Tradition holds that Patrick penned the prayer before speaking to an Irish king about following Christ. The “breastplate” alludes to the Armor of God, described by St. Paul in his letter to the Ephesians, called on by St. Patrick for protection in his mission to the Irish isle.

The coverage that Patrick illustrates is read as all-encompassing like Paul’s armor. Line after line, the Irish saint writes different ways in which Christ meets him, and us. Christ is with us, before us, behind, in, beneath, above, on our right and left, in every eye and in every ear. In his prayer, Patrick represents a wider tradition of Celtic spirituality that is closely tied to the spirituality we see in the Gospel according to John. The spirituality of through all things. ing that we can see the glory of Christ in the beauty of Creation. Think of the sunrises and sunsets we’re privileged to see. Imagine the summer storms that roll through the Nebraska plains. Glory and majesty and complexity and absolute beauty the likes of which we can only begin to appreciate.

Even the changing of seasons are reason to pause and behold the majesty of the God we serve. We get to watch it happen in real time. The leaves change, the fields grow brown, the days shorten. Where do you see God in the creation around you? In the endlessly complex colors upon an autumn tree? In an appreciation for knowing why those trees are even changing color?

I love this time of year because I like to sit back and watch as the beautiful fall colors start to pop. I’m not smart enough to understand why or how it happens. But even then, I get to appreciate all the processes, unknown to me, by which fall colors happen. My earthly eyes might only see above me the oranges and reds and yellows. My eyes of faith, though, might just be able to see a Creator worth appreciating, worth loving, and worth serving. We only need look long enough with eyes of faith to see the amazing God we serve all around us.

Now Hiring at “F” Street Neighborhood Church

We have all seen the signs in windows and at the curb advertising for people to come in and apply for a job. Well, here is your sign. We are now flying the sign letting people, who are a part of “F” Street Church, know that we are hiring. In fact we are hiring four new employees. Seriously.

These four individuals are to be Team Developers. Each of the four part-time positions should average about five hours a week (or 20 hours a month). The pay is \$250 a month. Each Team Developer is responsible for a specific area of ministry.

Church Structure Team Developer: This person will oversee the teams that handle the facilities and finances that make “F” Street Neighborhood Church possible.

Celebrations Team Developer: This individual will oversee the teams that help us to worship (primarily Sunday Morning).

Connections Team Developer: The one who oversees this area will be working with areas of discipleship.

Community Team Developer: These teams are focused on reaching out into the community.

Applications are available on the back table of church along with the unique job descriptions for each position. Applications, along with a resume, are due no later than Sunday November 11.

Elders

The current Elders of “F” Street Neighborhood Church are planning to add at least one new elder to the team. At this time, Keith Morrissey, Tad Stryker, and Pastor Jeff Heerspink, serve as elders.

Our process requires that members of “F” Street Church (defined as having a relationship with Jesus, and are active in giving, serving and attending this church), nominate individuals who they perceive as meeting the qualifications as listed in 1 Timothy 3, and Titus 1. For your convenience, we are listing here the qualifications from our Elder Document for you to read. If you know of men who meet these requirements, please fill out a nomination card. These cards are located in the back of church. Please turn cards in by Sunday, November 11.

After the names are collected, the current elders will prayerfully select one or more individuals to join the “F” Street Church team of elders. Those individuals will be informed of the role and requirements, and asked to prayerfully consider joining the elders. Their names will then be presented to the congregation, who will be given time to share any concerns and/or reasons for these men to not serve as elders. If there be no reason for them not to stand, they will then be installed as elders sometime around the new year.

This is an important process and we ask that everyone please be in prayer for this process.

At “F” Street Neighborhood Church, a biblical leader is someone who exemplifies these character qualities:

Above reproach / blameless (I Tim 3:2, Titus 1:6 NIV).

Husband of one wife (I Tim 3:2, Titus 1:6).

Temperate (I Tim 3:2), **self controlled** (I Tim 3:2, Titus 1:8), **upright, holy and disciplined** (Titus 1:8)

Respectable (I Tim 3:2), **hospitable** (I Tim 3:2, Titus 1:8).

Not overbearing (Titus 1:7), **not given to drunkenness** (I Tim 3:3, Titus 1:7), **not violent but gentle** (I Tim 3:3, Titus 3:7), **not quarrelsome** (I Tim 3:3) or **not quick tempered** (Titus 1:7), **not a lover of money** (I Tim 3:3) or **not pursue dishonest gain** (Titus 1:7).

Able to teach (I Tim 3:2). **He must hold firmly to the trustworthy message as it has been taught, so that he can encourage others by sound doctrine and refute those who oppose it** (Titus 1:9).

He must manage his own family well and see that his children obey him with proper respect. (If anyone does not know how to manage his own family, how can he take care of God's church?) (I Tim 3:4-5, Titus 1:6).

He must not be a recent convert, or he may become conceited and fall under the same judgment as the devil (I Tim 3:6).

He must also have a good reputation with outsiders, so that he will not fall into disgrace and into the devil's trap (I Tim 3:7).

Lover of what is good (Titus 1:8).

In addition, it is important that each of the elders also meet the following requirements that are specific to accomplish the ministry of “F” Street Neighborhood Church, understanding and living out of the mission and vision of “F” Street Neighborhood Church.

Chad and Julie Resser Update: Missionaries in Spain

(An offering will be taken, on November 4th, to support their work)

We recently met with one of our financial partners, and he gave us some advice. He told us that you, our financial support team, want to know our exact needs and why we have them. So, today we want to let you know some specifics about where we are financially and what our needs are.

We currently have commitments for about 80% of our support need.

There are a few reasons for this:

1. The biggest reason is that we have significantly raised our housing budget. For the past 3 years, we have lived in an apartment and co-existed with a very difficult downstairs neighbor. Over the past couple of months we have come to realize the stress that our living situation has put on our family. After much prayer and seeking godly counsel, we believe that God is leading us to move out of our apartment and pursue renting a home for our family.
2. Inflation. We have now been living on support for 10 years and during that time the cost of living has gone up approximately 30%. Our support package naturally goes up as the cost of living increases, and we experience the same increases as everyone in areas such as medical insurance, for example.
3. Lost support. As you might imagine with a support team of approximately 100 individuals and 11 churches, our financial partners go through life changes and that affects people's ability to partner with us. Over the 10 years that we have been on support, we have had partners pass away, experience illness or the loss of a spouse, change or lose jobs, divorce, retire...etc.and this affects their ability to partner with us. We praise God for the financial partners He brings to our team while knowing that some will need to move on as God leads.

We also have current needs for one-time gifts, and here are a couple of reasons for that:

1. One-time gifts help with any short-fall we have at the end of the year. Each year one-time gifts help us to end the year financially secure. This year has been particularly expensive for our family due to the costs associated with traveling and visiting the U.S.
2. In recent years, due to complicated Spanish bureaucracy, we have needed to hire a lawyer to help us maintain our legal permission to live in Spain. We anticipate that 2019 will be the same, which means that we will need approximately \$5,000 to help us pay the legal fees to legally reside in Spain.

Mexican Lasagna

Ingredients for Potatoes:

10 6-inch corn tortillas
2 c. canned, low sodium, black beans, rinsed
4 c. or 2 cans of Mexican style tomatoes, and 1 can of tomato sauce, mixed together for a chunky sauce
1 1/2 c. Monterey Jack cheese, grated
1 bag (10oz) spinach leaves, rinsed
2 c. chopped, roasted chicken or turkey (leftover friendly)
Non-stick cooking spray



Instructions:

- 1) Preheat oven to 400 F
- 2) Lightly spray a 9x13" baking pan with cooking spray
- 3) Place 2-3 tortillas on the bottom, trimming as needed to fit
- 4) Add beans, 1 c. tomato sauce mix, 1/2 c. grated cheese
- 5) Top with 2 or 3 more tortillas
- 6) Add 1 c. sauce mix with 2 more tortillas
- 7) Add chicken or turkey, and 1 c. of sauce mix, then top with 2 more tortillas
- 8) Add 1 c. sauce mix 1/2 c. cheese, and cilantro
- 9) Bake for 30 minutes, or until cheese is melted and browned, and the meat is thoroughly heated
- 10) Let stand for 5 minutes, then cut into 8 even squares and serve

"F" Street Church Stewardship Series and Financial Peace University

Hello "F" Street Neighborhood Church,

As we begin the month of November, the sermons are moving into the stewardship series, where we learn what the Bible has to say about managing God's resources.

God owns it all. We are asked, and expected to manage his resources. The Bible has instructed us to take care of ourselves, then our families, then our communities, and finally the world at large.

Stewardship can take many forms. As a church, we will learn many ideas that help us understand what stewardship is, and how we can serve as good stewards of God's resources, including God's people.

stew·ard·ship - noun: *A theological belief that humans are responsible for the world, and should take care of it. Believers in stewardship are usually people who believe in one God who created the universe and all that is within it, also believing that they must take care of creation and look after it.*

God has a great deal to say about this subject. Crown Financial did a survey of the Bible and found over 2350 verses that talk about money, economics, and stewardship. Some additional, well published facts are:

- In the New Testament, Jesus offers more wisdom and has

more to say about money than any other subject besides the "Kingdom of God."

- In the New Testament, Jesus talked more about money than he did Heaven and Hell combined. Eleven of the 39 parables he tells are about finances.

We are called by Jesus to learn about, and manage money and resources. Why? Why would we manage money well? Think about being a "good Christian." Many toxic beliefs are out there, such as "money is the root of all evil." Wrong! The Bible says, "The love of money..." There is a big difference. As Christians, we should make it a priority to manage money and build some wealth. If we don't who will? Money is amoral. It does not care if it's used to prosper thieves, violence, oppressive governments, or killing. However, money used in the right hands, can be used for all the things that are good and decent in our world. It is up to us to learn what the Holy Spirit want us to do with money, and all of God's resources.

To that end, "F" Street Neighborhood Church is including, within the Stewardship series, a new opportunity for you to learn about money and building a legacy. I am very excited to announce that for the first time, we are going to offer Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University at the Redeemer building, starting January 6, 2019! *(continued on the next page)*

John

Written between AD 85 and 95, while serving the church in Ephesus, John penned the gospel that highlights the divine qualities of Christ as the Son of God. One commentator says that the first half of John's gospel might be known as the "Book of Signs," because it highlights seven of Jesus' miracles performed during his ministry. This book, more than any of the other gospels, points to Jesus as the God-man, the one who died for our sins, and was risen to new, eternal life. Many of the miraculous signs that John captures in his book are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, and "that by believing in him you will have life by the power of his name." Come, read and enjoy, the life-giving message and hope of eternal life in Christ that has brought countless people to belief in Jesus as their Lord and Savior.

1 Thessalonians

This letter is written by the apostle Paul as an encouragement to a fledgling church. After stopping there on his second missionary journey, Paul preached in the synagogues over an approximately three months time. During that time, he drew gentiles out of idolatry to a life in Christ. Much of Paul's teaching in this letter encourages godliness amidst questions and trials, so that the believer might look towards Christ's return while their life is being sanctified by the hope of Jesus Christ. The power of the Spirit to promote growth was, for Paul in this letter, ultimately tied to their hope in Christ's return.

2 Thessalonians

Paul wrote 2 Thessalonians within a few months after his first letter. Writing (to combat false teachers who distorted his words and even wrote false letters in his name), Paul writes about what to expect in the end times. The future hope of Christ's return would provide the Thessalonian believers with encouragement in their suffering, and the motivation to continue to grow in godliness, as they persevered amidst trial and hardship. Hope in Christ, still today, encourages the church to continue to honor God with how we live our lives and live responsibly for Him.

2 Peter

In his second letter to the same group of believers, scattered throughout the north of Asia Minor, Peter defends "knowledge." Referred to, some fifteen times in the three chapters of this letter, Peter reiterates that knowledge and knowing the word of God are the primary means of growth for the Christian. Pursuing this spiritual maturity was the first line of defense against false teachers and heretics, who sought to tear down the church with unbiblical theology about God. This letter encourages us to consider the importance we give in our own life - of clinging to knowledge of God as it is revealed in scripture. For Peter, the proper knowledge of God could combat the false teachers living amongst the churches he wrote to, and could grow their faith by attending to the word of God.
