ATLAS of Lincoln: December Update

A couple weeks ago, I was sitting in my office over at the Redeemer building. About mid-morning, a young man came to the door, and I let him in, thinking he was there to see the folks who live in the upstairs apartment. He wasn't, but asked if he could hang out a bit and warm up. The wind-chill that day was barely above zero-degrees, he had been riding his bike down the street and stopped because it was so cold. I offered a water, and he sat down in my office. He said his name was Atem.

That day he had been evicted from his friends' place. Atem had been couch-surfing for a couple months and had been posted up at a buddy's apartment for the previous few weeks. He told me about his time in Lincoln and how he had moved there as a kid, spoke of his appreciation of the city and the people in it, despite his hardships and the coming winter. He asked me about myself and Atlas, and we talked for a while.

We chatted for 10 or 15 minutes. Eventually he finished the water and prepared to move along. We shook hands and he headed to the door, but turned back and gave me a hug. Atem told me that our conversation had been a bright spot in a really bad day. This is my dream for Atlas: Lincoln: to be a place to come when you don't know where else to go. I pray that it can be a place for people to come to feel loved and accepted, a place to come to find truth and direction, a place to come to be seen and heard, even if it's just 15 minutes on a random, bitterly-cold Tuesday. I pray that we might be the hands and feet of Christ in every sense of the verse.

I'm amazed at how little it takes to touch lives for Christ. The God we serve is so big that he moves even in the smallest acts of kindness, which can be amazingly meaningful. Even small acts and brief conversations can shine Christ's bright light for everyone around us.

I hope and pray I get to see Atem again. Even if I don't, I can trust God will move in his life as the Lord does in the lives of so many others.

Isaiah 9:6 – “For unto us a Child is born...” Isaiah 7:14 – “...call him Immanuel.”

One of the most amazing aspects of Christmas season, in my opinion, is the reality of the nativity. The God of the universe, who can make and unmake all things, who knows everything, can do anything, and can be anywhere, is brought into the world as the most fragile of beings.

I don't have much experience with babies, but I know enough to know they're pretty breakable and needy. They need their heads held up, they need feeding and changing, basically 24/7 care. God, the one who pinned up the sky, who built the mountains from scratch and dug out the deepest oceans, who paints glorious pictures at sunrise and sunset, came into the form of a *baby*. Why?

There's significance in smallness. God could have come as a conquering war hero. The teachers of the law and priests of Jesus' time expected such a return. However, I don't think into our lives. They called the Christ-child literally God with us, meeting us in smallness.

How might today? Is there even a place for smallness in your life?

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I, too often, pass off the smallness for being small (crazy, right?). The smallness, though, is a “one day at a time,” one kind word to a friend in need, one hour spent a week with someone who's hurting. Those opportunities are everywhere and around us every day. The nativity reminds us to press into the smallness, to crack open those moments and see how the God of the universe moves in them. The thing is not to just do this in the Christmas season, but in every day of every month of every year. Because, just as God came to us in the form of a baby, so too might God be in that “one day at a time,” that one kind word, that one hour. That's Immanuel. That's God with us. That's the significance of smallness.

Following is a delicious recipe for A Merry Cranberry Salad!

Frozen Cranberry Salad

There are no portion or calories available for this recipe...it's just one of my own personal favorites from my daughter Amy's kitchen. ENJOY! It is delicious.

Ingredients:

- 1-12 oz. pkg. fresh or frozen cranberries, thawed
- 1 1/2 c. granulated sugar
- 1-20 oz. can crushed pineapple
- 1-16 oz. pkg. mini marshmallows
- 2 c. whipping cream
- 2 Tbsp. powdered sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1 c. chopped walnut (optional)

Instructions:

- 1) In a blender, process cranberries until coarsely ground.
- 2) Place cranberries in a bowl and add 1 1/2 c. of granulated sugar, mix well, cover and chill for 1 hour.
- 3) Drain the pineapple, reserving 1/4 c. of the juice.
- 4) In a large mixing bowl, combine marshmallows pineapple and juice. Mix well, cover and chill for 1 hour.
- 5) After chilling, take both the cranberry mixture and the pineapple mixture and mix together. Cover and chill an additional hour.
- 6) In another mixing bowl, beat cream until soft peaks form, then beat in powdered sugar and vanilla.
- 7) Fold cream mixture into pineapple/cranberry mixture, add walnuts if desired.
- 8) Freeze until ready to serve.

2 Peter

In his second letter to the same group of believers, scattered throughout the north of Asia Minor, Peter defends “knowledge.” Referred to, some fifteen times in the three chapters of this letter, Peter reiterates that knowledge and knowing the word of God are the primary means of growth for the Christian. Pursuing this spiritual maturity was the first line of defense against false teachers and heretics, who sought to tear down the church with unbiblical theology about God. This letter encourages us to consider the importance we give in our own life - of clinging to knowledge of God as it is revealed in scripture. For Peter, the proper knowledge of God could combat the false teachers living amongst the churches he wrote to, and could grow their faith by attending to the word of God.

Jude

The Bible and tradition suggest that this letter was written by Jesus’ half brother, Jude. The letter is hard to date because of its lack of detail in recounting people and places, but scholars suggest it was most likely written around AD 67 to 80. In this letter, Jude draws on the Bible imagery of Cain killing Abel and the punishment of Sodom and Gomorrah to condemn those who rejected authority and those who sought to please themselves. Believers could stand against those who sought to tear down the church by remembering the teachings of the apostles, building each other up in the faith, praying in the Holy Spirit, and keeping themselves in the love of God. This short, punchy book exhorts us as believers to stand for the truth against error.

Revelation

Coming from the Greek word for apocalypse, the title of this last book in the Bible provides the backdrop for the end of history and the culmination of God’s plan for life here on Earth. What began in Paradise at the beginning of the Bible ends in Paradise at the close of the Bible. The book is for those who hope in Christ and long for the beauty, hope, and fulfillment of God’s final chapter when the brokenness of sin is healed. We will dwell once again in all of the fullness of God’s presence, no longer separated from Him. While Revelation is a book of hope for the redeemed, it also paints in stunning symbolism the tribulation and judgement of God on those who do not believe. The book of Revelation is God’s final answer action upon sin when pain, tears, and death are no more and for those who have trusted in Christ eternal life is forevermore.
