Stop Talking



In reading through the books of Timothy, I have been confronted, personally, on the danger of talking. In fact, just moments before writing this, I realized how easy it is for me to want to talk rather than listen. I had to go apologize for my desire to be heard rather than to hear. Paul states to Timothy, "Don't let them waste their time in endless discussion of myths and spiritual pedigrees. These things only lead to meaningless speculations, which don't help people live a life of faith in God. The purpose of my instruction is that all believers would be filled with love that comes from a pure heart, a clear conscience, and genuine faith." - 1 Timothy 1:4-5. Paul repeats this idea of the danger of talking, not only in 1 Timothy, but also in his second book to Timothy.

I have been left to ponder the modern equivalent of this for us today. In a time where there are many who have strong opinions about politics, COVID, and race. I wonder if we, as followers of Christ, too are too busy talking, with too little love in action. After all, Micah 6:8 states, "...this is what he requires of you: to do what is right, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God."

Each of the three things that Paul says God requires of us are actions bigger than our mouths moving.

Con- where we speak the truth in love, offering grace, truth, or acceptance and direction to our world. Let's not forget what Paul states in his letter to the Corinthians, "For the Kingdom of God is not just a lot of talk; it is living by God's power." - 1 Corinthians 4:20.

I want to encourage us, as followers of Jesus, to be careful in this time, about the amount of talk that we have that is not backed by the way that we live our lives. As our world seems to be becoming more and more divided and divisive, we need to be careful that we are "not wasting our time caught up in the endless discussion, that lead to meaningless speculation which don't help people live a life of faith in God." We need to love, love our neighbor as ourselves.

What if we were to:

- Think less about what we want to say in a post, or in response to someone we disagree with, or are angry with, and think more about how we can love that person, and take time to pray for them. We should seek to bless, rather than curse, those you disagree with. Jesus taught us, in the Sermon on the Mount, and modeled with his life and death, "But I say, love your enemies! Pray for those who persecute you! In that way, you will be acting as true children of your Father in heaven..." - Matthew 5:44-45.
- Spend more time listening to others, specifically those different than ourselves. Remember, James 1:19 states, "Understand this, my dear brothers and sisters: You must all be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to get angry."

er this a congregational meeting, and we would agree, we just like the idea that we are a family.


To be family is to be a member of “F” Street Church, and to be a member is defined by the following:

As the newest member of the “F” Street Neighborhood Church staff team, you may be wondering what exactly I will be doing. That is a good question to consider, as our two congregations merge, and Jeff and I form a partnership as ministers of Christ.

My work alongside of Jeff will focus in four main areas: preaching, pastoral care and counseling, discipleship, and training. In this article I will briefly describe my responsibilities in the area of discipleship. I plan to do the same with the other assigned areas in future articles of our church newsletter.

There are two reasons why I have chosen to talk about discipleship first. One, is the priority that Jesus gave to this in his Great Commission, recorded in Matthew 28, Mark 16, Luke 24, John 20, and Acts 1. It has been well said that his last command should be our first concern. I believe that this is true! “F” Street Neighborhood Church desires to be a congregation where we make disciples (those who are fully devoted followers of Jesus Christ).

A second reason is due to the timing of the calendar. While summer has just begun, it will not be long before fall will arrive. With the start of the new school year, we want to be prepared to build upon our current efforts in two key areas of discipleship. One is our Community Groups, the other is helping new believers get established and growing in their relationships with Christ (including baptism).

Right now, I am in the process of learning how these things work at “F” Street Church. I want to see what we are doing well, so that we can adjust, and do these things even better in the future. In the days ahead, I will greatly appreciate hearing your thoughts on this very important mission we have been

given: To make disciples!

Hello to my brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus,

What a strange season it has been. However strange it has been for us, God knew long before it happened that it would happen just as it is.
