For the past several years we have been blessed by volunteers, as well as some paid residents who have helped "F" Street Neighborhood Church to have a Youth Ministry. Over time, it has met on several different nights, has had both a combined and a separated Youth programs (Middle School and High School), and has met in different locations (Church and Redeemer building).

Today we have more middle and high school kids at "F" Street Church, but we have no Youth Ministry. It is not that we do not want one, or that we do not plan to have one. It is more the timing of things with Meg resigning, COVID-19, and merging with Jacob's Well.

We are prayerfully processing the situation, and would encourage many of you join us in this process. Recently I read a book titled, "Sticky Faith" (I would encourage any parent or interested church member to read this book), that speaks of the importance of students being spiritually engaged in the church. The findings are that students who engage - spiritually at home and at church - with adults, have higher rates of staying connected (sticking) with the church, as compared to traditional youth ministries.



Therefore, our Elders are considering what it would look like if our Team Leaders were more intentional to include students in the different teams. Some examples of this are: Savannah, who has included several students on the Block Party Team, John and Scott who have students working with them in Sound and Video teams, or Adam who has a student on the Worship Team. This is not to say that we simply use students for their work but to include them in the ministry, build relationships with them and share experiences with them.

Beth and I were grateful for the request, but a little unsure how to answer that initially. Then came the idea that had been sparked by a dinner at the Thornton's: [Build a tiny library/food hut.](#)

See, the Thornton's had been putting food into their tiny library, in front of their home, and the food was being utilized by the neighborhood.

Our friends built our little library/hut (quit large). After setting it up in the yard, we offer one shelf of books and three shelves were left for food/toiletries. From the start we had plenty of food and toiletries dropped off. As these items were stocked, more and more people have stopped by to see what is in it. I witnessed one guy stop in the middle of 13th get out of his van and grab a few cans of food. We have also witnessed people dropping off food, or others giving us money to buy more food. Many have also called up to us, while we are on the porch, or even stopped us in the yard to thank us. Building a bridge to talk with them about it, and get to know them, even share with them why we do it.

The struggle we have today is keeping it stocked with nonperishable foods and toiletries. We are looking for people to help. If possible, maybe you could stop by and stock it up, or leave items on our porch for us to distribute over time. This way we can continue to be a blessing in the neighborhood and build relationships with the people that God has called us to serve. The Thornton's are also open to you helping to keep theirs stocked. If you prefer to give cash you can do that as well and we can pick up supplies while out shopping. Thanks.



Lincoln School of Ministry Begins Another Year Bill Thornton, Teaching Pastor

For the past few years the F Street Neighborhood Church and Jacob's Well have partnered together to provide training that equips disciples for service in the local church and the surrounding community. Beginning in September, the Lincoln School of Ministry will offer the first of three modules that are scheduled to be completed by May 2021.

The Fall module which begins in September will last 12 weeks. It



will provide students with a basic theological foundation and will include a survey of the Old Testament and New Testament scriptures, an overview of Church History, as well as an introduction to Christian Doctrine.

The Winter module is scheduled to start in January and will last 10 weeks. It will provide practical instruction in key areas of ministry including Biblical communication, pastoral care, and evangelism.

Finally, the Spring module is slated to begin in late March and will also last 10 weeks. It will address how to care for one's self, marriage, and family while serving others, as well as considering other important topics likely to be faced by leaders in the local church and community being served.
