Rules. No one likes a lot of rules, especially when they do not make sense to us. Recently we have been working with some "new rules" at F Street Church, and I want to make sure that you understand the "why" behind them. Rules might be a strong word, but our security team is working to enforce them, including having doors closed until 10:00 a.m., using the front entrance, and closing the sanctuary doors.

This is all being done, not to frustrate anyone, but to improve everyone's worship experience. We are keeping the doors closed until 10:00 a.m. so that those who need to be in the church are able to accomplish their tasks and get prepared to host, and care for those about to enter. This also is for the safety of all, by preventing people from wandering through the building. We are changing the footpath flow to the front doors, to limit congestion where parents need to be, dealing with their children in nursery and journey group. This will also limit congestion in the office stairwell, with folks navigating the stairs. The sanctuary doors will remain closed, and we request that people leave through the back of church, to use restrooms or go outside. This will limit the distractions for those in the worship service, and limit the flow of people near our children's ministry.

Please understand that these "rules" are there to improve everyone's experience. I know that for some it is simply a matter of learning new patterns. It can be hard to retrain ourselves, but I hope that you understand why and are able and willing to help us all by making the changes.

What many celebrate and love about the F Street Church family is that we are a Bible believing and teaching church that puts a

When we started F Street Neighborhood Church, it was the intent to be a church within the CRC, as that is the organization that started and supported the Northern Lighthouse. It was a generous donor from the CRC who purchased our building, and it was a gift from the RCA that paid for Brett Byford in his first years of ministry. It has been small grants, given throughout the journey, along with gifts from individuals within these denominations, and with work trips that have allowed us to be in existence. For this we give thanks to God.

Why are we joining a denomination? I like to think of churches, like people, as individual brides of Christ. We all know that we are better together as we were created to be in community so should churches as we can do more together. For some this may be recent news, but for others of us, it was the plan all along.

Being connected to a denomination brings accountability. In recent years we have seen many independent churches rise with rapid growth and popularity only to crash, causing potentially more casualties for the kingdom of God then those it helped. They often have been built around a leader or set of leaders who resisted accountability. What we believe about God matters, and being in community both as individuals as well as a church matters.

So, in the months ahead we will be working towards following through on our commitment to be a part of the CRC and RCA as an organized church. I will provide more information, and we will have a family meeting in January to share more about this process and answer questions.

My Role As Coach at F Street Church

A few years ago, my dad handed me a booked called the "Coach Model," and asked me if I would read it and begin coaching him. It felt strange because of the role reversal, but I gave it a shot. I still meet with my dad today and with several other individuals. I have gone on to receive additional training as a coach, and I love experiencing both the process and the results.

What is the coaching process?

The goal of coaching is to help a person get "unstuck." It could be something big or little. A person might be stuck in their finances, marriage, conflict resolution skills, addiction, job, health, parenting, ability to study the Bible, or whatever. A coach helps a person develop awareness about the situation, and come up with action steps that will move them toward getting unstuck. Coaching provides accountability and support for the individual taking action steps (each week a client shares the progress they made toward their goals).

Coaching recognizes that nobody likes to be told what to do all of the time. It utilizes the skill of asking powerful questions and giving space for processing. Christian coaching recognizes the vital role of the Holy Spirit in the entire process and becomes a

tool that the Holy Spirit can use for transformation. Coaching is support, accountability, action, and goal setting.

How often do you meet with a coaching client?

We meet every other week for one hour. Typically we commit to twelve sessions, but it may be more or less depending on the situation.

Who do you meet with?

I meet with anyone from F Street Church and/or Celebrate Recovery who would like to see a specific change in their life that would bring honor and glory to God, and who would like to have support as they work toward that change. I also have one-time appointments available for anyone who would simply like to process or receive support in a specific situation.

When are you available to meet?

I currently have two openings in my schedule for new clients. I have 9:15-10:15 a.m. on Tuesday morning or 10:30-11:30 a.m. on Thursday mornings. I can do a Zoom appointment or in person.

How do I set up an appointment to meet?

We're fortunate in our Art Chapel renovation because we have a boatload of smart and passionate college students who are doing most of that work for us, at no charge! The student architects of the UNL College of Architecture have invested months of their time and skill to planning our renovation, down to the tiniest, beautiful detail. Now, after all of that preparation, they're starting to build things like windows, cabinets, work tables, storage cubes, a rolling ladder, and a huge and unique rolling wall. Progress at the Art Chapel will soon become visible!

We are working with a team from Crounse Construction, and they've been amazingly gracious and professional. Our foreman, Dave Crouse, has freely shared his time and expertise, working alongside the UNL students as they translate their plans from paper to wood, glass, and steel.

Your prayers for the Art Chapel are needed and greatly appreciated:

F Street Church Staff and the Art Ministry Team long to have the heart and mind of Christ and to be a blessing to our contractor, the students and professors at UNL, and to all the other contractors and city workers who will be involved in the renovation. Pray for God to begin gathering artists and makers to operate Art Chapel programs, and that those people and programs will enrich the lives of people who participate. Pray for funding to continue to come in; especially for favor for our application for a substantial grant, which will be decided in early December. Applications for permits are S-L-O-W-L-Y working their way through city government offices; please pray that we will be

given a green light soon.
