Is there anything in your house, or otherwise in your possession that holds special meaning to you? Perhaps something that, if it were damaged or misplaced, would cause you great sadness or heartache? Think about this item, and why does it hold so much value to you? Maybe it's the monetary value. Maybe it's the circumstance with which you obtained it. Did you win it? Did you work really hard for a long time to purchase it? In most cases I think the reason something holds so much value in our minds is that it was given to us by someone very special: a dear friend, a sibling, or a parent or grandparent.

Recently I had a situation that forced me to ponder this topic. As many of you may know, my dad passed away in October of 2021. As a result, his pickup truck was passed on to me. Do I get that upset when one of those gifts has been "scratched?" When I have neglected them or even damaged them? What would it look like to place that much value on what God has entrusted us with? With the gifts he has given freely to us? Do we hold these gifts to be higher in value than our earthly treasures we store up ...my pickup included. Let's spur one another on to not neglect or damage the gifts God has given to us. It is one of the most important acts of worship we can bring to him, who is worthy.

As I have been preparing my message that will be a part of the BLESS series at Bethlehem Church, I thought their strategy a good one for us to consider and employ in the neighborhoods where we live, as well as the neighborhood where we serve together in the heart of Lincoln.

Begin with prayer (Acts 1:3-8)

Listen with care (Acts 8:26-39)

Eating together (Luke 19:1-10)

Serving together (John 13:1-17)

Share your story (Acts 17:16-34)

Personally, I think this is a great plan (and maybe a future sermon series) for us to consider. I greatly appreciate the practicality of it. These are things that each of us can do with our neighbors, regardless of our background or experience. I think it is especially important to notice how influencing others starts with seeking the Lord first, and then taking the time to get to know them. These foundational steps help us know better how to share the Gospel in word and deed in the hope of seeing transformed lives around us

Freedom to Serve

When Paul is talking to the Galatians about freedom he says, "For you have been called to live in freedom, my brothers and sisters. But don't use your freedom to satisfy your sinful nature. Instead, use your freedom to serve one another in love" (Galatians 5:13, NLT). To me, that definition of freedom sounds distinctly different from the one I often use which would go something like: "Freedom is my ability to do whatever I want, whenever I want." Mine is an attractive definition because it appeals directly to the shallow desires of my flesh, but according to Paul, this isn't how we should define freedom at all.

Paul tells the Galatians that while they have been made free through Christ, they should use that freedom for a specific purpose. That specific purpose could probably best be described as love, but not in a romantic, selfish, all-consuming sense. According to the Bible, love as God defines it, might even compel us to give up some of our freedoms for the good of others. In John Mark Comer's book "Live No Lies" he defines love as "the desire not to take, but to give." So if you're loving someone as Jesus loves them, you are concerned with their flourishing or what's good for them over and above your flourishing or what's good for you. It's simple enough to understand in concept, but to apply that concept to our lives takes a great deal of discipline and consistency - a death to self on a daily, hourly and even minute by minute basis. The good news is, Jesus, through his death and resurrection, made a way for us to overcome ourselves and gave us the fruits of the Spirit which, by grace, stand in direct opposition to the desires of our flesh.

As the Benevolence Team Leader here at F Street Church, I have found the only way to truly love those whom I interact with here at the church, is to attempt to actually value their good over my own. Even though I'm imperfect and don't always do that, it is a comfort to me to know God is actively working with me and those I come into contact with. He spoke all of us into existence, and then chose us as partners for his work; not only in the life to come, but right now. In light of this incredible truth, and the absolute miracle of my salvation, I have to remember that while I am free to do as I please, I was created with purpose in mind. Purpose that can only be discovered in pursuing relationship to the Father, through Jesus, by the Holy Spirit.

A 2023 Financial Update: Why is Giving

As we near the halfway point of 2023, I want to give you an update on our monthly giving goal, and some biblical advice about the benefits of giving financially to God's work.

You may recall that our board of elders decided to raise our local giving goal to \$12,500 per month in 2023. We have not yet hit that goal in any month, although we came very close (within \$3) in May.

In the first five months of 2023, we have taken in \$54,046 in local offerings - an average of \$10,809 per month. That's a little over 86 percent of our goal. We look forward to a strong second half of generous giving.

What does the Bible have to say about financial giving? It makes it clear that giving is good for us, especially if we do it with the right attitude. Here are some important themes to remember:

- -Giving reminds us that everything belongs to God (Haggai 2:8), and it helps us learn to be content (1 Timothy 6:6-10).
- It reminds us that money is not a reliable source of satisfaction (Ecclesiastes 5:10).
- Attitude is important. God says we should be generous (2 Corinthians 8:1-6) while being cheerful about it (2 Corinthians 9:7).
- Giving should be done thoughtfully (1 Corinthians 16:2), with thanksgiving (Psalm 50:14).

I finish with this prayer: Thank you, Lord, for giving us the opportunity to invest in Your work in our neighborhood through F Street Church.

My identity is my sense of self. Who I perceive myself to be, radically impacts my sense of purpose, belonging, and worth. How do I base my identity on who God says I am? How do I discover the truth of who I am in Christ? How do I avoid pitfalls of comparison? How do I walk in confidence rather than pride or shame? Who am I in Christ? These are questions that we will explore in one of our Celebrate Recovery Open Share groups (taught by Ronda Simpson and myself), directly following the large group gathering on Wednesday nights.

Other "open share" groups, in addition to the Identity/Self-Image group mentioned above, include Chemical Dependency, Codependence and Emotional struggles, and Sex Addiction.

Celebrate Recovery is a place where anyone can come. We all have hurts, habits, and hang ups that are helpful to be honest about, and deal with in the context of community and accountability. The first hour includes worship, celebration, teaching and testimony. The second hour includes open share groups and Solid Rock Cafe (cookies and conversation).
