Art for "Just Like Us" JEAN STRYKER, STAFF ARTIST

On September 17, our pastors began "Just Like Us: A Study of the Life and Ministry of Elijah the Prophet." For each of the ten sermons in this series, there will be a new artwork on display in the church sanctuary. The art is a tribute to the works of Sadao Watanabe, a Japanese artist raised in Tokyo who chose to follow Jesus in 1930 at age 17.

Watanabe learned his technique while apprenticed to a maker of kimono fabrics. He worked in a traditional Japanese folk art style and placed Biblical subjects in a Japanese context. His works were painted on mulberry paper that was squeezed and wrinkled to give a rough quality to the prints.

Watanabe once remarked that he preferred that his prints hang in the ordinary places of life: "I would most like to see them [his prints] hanging where people ordinarily gather, because Jesus brought the gospel for the people." It seems appropriate to have art that echoes Sadao Watanabe's style at F Street Church, where we seek to share the good news of the Gospel with ordinary people where they are. Watanabe made several images of the prophet Elijah, who was called "a man just like us," an ordinary man.

Seven Deadly Sins: Part 1 The Language of Spiritual Battle

The Seven Deadly Sins were originally conceived of and written down by fourth century ascetic monk Evagrius of Pontus. Evagrius actually referred to the sins as "demons" or "evil thoughts" and he wrote down eight of them, instead of seven. Evagrius titled this writing: "Talking Back: A Monastic Handbook for Combating Demons." According to Evagrius, a monk or Christ follower should very literally talk back to fight their demons, evil thoughts or what we might refer to today as "intrusive thoughts", using the Word of The Lord as their weapon. He originally wrote the handbook for other monks who lived in isolation or practiced an ascetic lifestyle, as a means to help them understand how these evil thoughts might interfere with their spiritual life. Evagrius' method of combating demons was to use God's Word in direct response to the demonic or evil thoughts. So, his handbook is written in a sort of call and response style, in which Evagrius names the demonic thought, and then writes and cites his appropriate scriptural response. Here is one example from Evagrius' chapter on the demon, Sadness:

From The Gospel of John

67. Against the soul that does not understand that weakness of faith brings trepidation and fear into the heart: <u>Do not let your hearts be troubled. Have faith in God, have faith also in me (John 14:1).</u>

Evagrius' eight evil thoughts as he listed them were: gluttony, fornication, avarice (love of money), sadness, anger, listlessness (sloth), vainglory and pride. A student of Evagrius, named John Cassian, eventually brought this handbook to the Western Church where it was translated from Greek to Latin, Pope Gregory I got rid of "sloth," added "envy," then removed "pride" from the list and placed it at the very top, calling it "the ruler of all the other vices." Thus, we finally arrived at the seven deadly sins, which were referred to as both "mortal" or "deadly" because they were thought to lead to the death of one's own soul. Later, the list would be revisited by a couple other early church fathers, namely Saint Thomas Aquinas, but in general, the list developed by Pope Gregory I is the one we refer to today.

Though this is admittedly a matter of opinion, I will show my hand at the onset and say I very much prefer Evagrius of Pontus's version of eight demons to combat as opposed to calling them seven deadly sins. My reasoning is primarily the overall aesthetic, a bit of biblical accuracy, and the language of spiritual battle rings truer for me from a Christ-centered perspective than thinking about this list of thoughts turned to action as sins which might kill me. Whatever your preference, it is nonetheless true that the "Seven Deadly Sins" originated as eight demonic thoughts or lies from evil meant to be responded to and ultimately defeated by the Word of The Lord. Ephesians 6:10-11 tells us: "Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes." Evagrius's handbook was a specifically targeted attempt at doing exactly that.

In the following weeks, I plan to look at each sin in more detail and explain how Evagrius of Pontus landed on each of them. It is important to remember that no apostle or biblical writer actually wrote a list of seven deadly sins or eight demonic thoughts for that matter. The list, though absolutely taken from scripture, is still a human attempt at understanding and making practical what scripture says. Yet there is potentially great value in understanding how early Christian thinkers viewed these demonic thoughts so we can apply their view to our lives today. These demons, evil thoughts, deadly sins, or lies were seen as important enough to name, explain and share with others for Evagrius (who has a fascinating testimony you could look into if you're interested suffice it to say, he was not always a Christian), so they should be at least that important to us.

Dave Widman is a hero of mine. Always willing to help and he has taken on some big projects here at F Street, whether running cable or rebuilding our bathrooms, Dave has been there. But Dave does not want to be the Team Leader of Building and Grounds.

So, we are looking for someone who meets the qualifications of a Team Leader (available upon request) and is able and willing to be responsible for the general maintenance and repairs for all the church facilities, including working with venders and volunteers.

Essential duties and responsibilities include:

- Inspect and maintain all church facilities.
- Perform ongoing maintenance and repairs.
- Coordinate and oversee outside vendors (AC, Plumbing, electrical, etc.)
- Assist in the upkeep of the grounds.
- Recommend Budget needs to the Elders.
- Invite, support and coordinate a team of volunteers when and where possible.

Education and Experience Required:

- General knowledge and experience in Building, Plumbing, Electrical, and HVAC.
- Able to inspect and diagnose problems and determine the best means to correct them.
- Able to keep records.
- Able to coordinate people.
- Must have a valid driver's license.

We put a lot of emphasis on prayer here at F Street. We recite the Lord's Prayer and the Apostles' Creed regularly. We pray before, during, and after worship services. We receive teaching on prayer. We're encouraged to pray for one another, for our neighborhood, for our leaders, for our own needs... By now, we all should be experts on prayer! And yet it seems like prayer: true, deep, meaningful prayer, is a rare occurrence for many of us. Why is that?

Maybe we make it more complicated than it needs to be. God doesn't want a great speech every time we come to him! One way to simplify prayer is to talk to God about your life as you would a friend right next to you: "God, thanks for this quiet minute as I drive to work." "God, what needs to go on this list I'm making right now?" "God, I'm sad about things with X right now." "God, I'm having trouble with this project. Will you help me?" "God, I hope we get a snow day tomorrow!" :)

Prayer is turning toward God with as much of our true self as we can muster. Putting our moments into words and expressing them to God opens a door for him to interact with us in that moment. That builds relationship and trust. As we build this habit, it can lead to a much deeper prayer life. We just need to start where we are and speak our simple, honest conversational prayers.

Where's the Church?

In 1984, Wendy's coined their still known "Where's the Beef?" question. This question was more of a negative campaign against other fast-food chains (who apparently were using too little beef), but it raises a similar question for me: "Where's the church?" The difference is that this is NOT a negative campaign against our church or any church, but rather a challenge to all of us who are the church.

Sometimes we can think of "the church" as a grouping of people, which can somehow limit us from taking on the responsibility ourselves. For example, we can be grateful for the things that "our church" does, giving away 10 percent of our local giving to serve the neighborhood or the community in which we live; however, we might not feel the need to be generous ourselves.

One specific area that I have been pondering is in the area of hospitality. That is an enormous topic of course, but not one that we should take lightly, specifically as many seem to feel we are entering or have entered the end times. Peter tells us:

7 The end of the world is coming soon. Therefore, be earnest and disciplined in your prayers. 8 Most important of all, continue to show deep love for each other, for love covers a multitude of sins. 9 Cheerfully share your home with those who need a meal or a place to stay.

- 1 Peter 4:7-9

Hospitality could include how you and I engage with others on Sunday Morning, or as the text points to, how you and I "cheerfully share our homes with those who need a meal or a place to stay." Again, it is easy to say that people who are hungry can go to the Gathering Place or to one of the food pantries, or FoodNet (all good things), but are we opening up our homes to people? Are we sharing meals with one another?

What ideas do you have for practicing hospitality? How can we, "the church," be obedient to Christ in this matter?

I hope that we all hear the king say:

'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the Kingdom prepared for you from the creation of the world. 35 For I was hungry, and you fed me. I was thirsty, and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger, and you invited me into your home. 36 I was naked, and you gave me clothing. I was sick, and you cared for me. I was in prison, and you visited me.'

- Matthew 25:34-36

"Where's the Church?" Let's see what God does in and through us when we all use the gifts and abilities we have been given.



Are you flourishing?

What do you think of when you hear the word "Flourish?" A tree? A flower? Yourself? Recently, I was part of a group, and we were asked a similar question. We also were given a circle that looked something like this:

We were told to use a pencil to shade in how satisfied we felt in each area. A better metric might be, "How well do I feel this area of my life glorifies God?" I challenge you to take 5 minutes and try it. (I know, it's probably too hard to find a pencil. But...it might be worth it if you do!)

My observation after doing this? The areas I felt the best about were the areas that I was growing in. They were actually areas that didn't come naturally to me, but I was making a concerted effort to change. The movement is what made me feel "satisfied." Interestingly, the definition of flourish is "To thrive; to grow vigorously."



The good news is that as believers, we don't have to labor and strive on our own effort. We have the Spirit of God within us, who strengths us, guides us, convicts us, empowers us, reminds us, comforts us, speaks to us, encourages us, motivates us and loves us. We have the grace of God that motivates us to grow, but also tells us we are ENOUGH because of what Christ has done. We can grow, we can seek to glorify God with different areas of our lives, and we can also rest and find our strength in Him.


