The Seven Deadly Sins: Part 5 - Against the Thoughts of Anger

This time, I'm going to start out with an entry from the Handbook by Evagrius of Pontus, which I've been basing these writings on.

1. Against the soul's thoughts that feed on anger against someone who received many good things from us and then complained about them:

So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up (Gal. 6:9).

Some anger is obvious. When your friends fought each other at school or at recess growing up, they were clearly angry with each other. You could see the physical and emotional consequences of the anger quite literally on their faces. When I punched my friend Ethan in the nose in seventh grade, I was clearly angry with him and everyone could tell, because Ethan's nose was bloody, and I was made to sit out for the remainder of PE class. And please don't worry everyone! I apologized, we worked it out, and by all accounts Ethan is doing great.

There is another type of anger that Evagrius draws to our attention with his thought and scriptural response above. This kind of anger is not so obvious, and as Evagrius puts it, "the soul feeds on it." Maybe we can successfully push down this anger or hide it while we're around others, but it's there. It often starts as a thought, or set of thoughts, that aren't necessarily based on anything true. It might even be a thought about someone we are close to, and we fixate on why they would have reacted to us in a particular way, or why they said or did this particular thing to us. We all have thoughts that, when and if we really think about them, probably weren't truly worth the spent time. But as soon as we've entertained these thoughts, we deeply struggle to simply let them pass. These thoughts of anger, at minimum, might form into bitterness or resentment towards a sister or brother in Christ. They also might, and often do, form into the more obvious, explosive anger I mentioned first.

Anger is sort of broadly, culturally defined as "our natural response to environmental threats." Psychology Today defines it as "what often arises when we feel our boundaries have been violated." Jesus tells us to love the Lord with all our hearts, and with all our souls, and with all our minds. Part of loving the Lord with all our minds is remembering that with each thought we have, we are also presented with choices. Choices to entertain our thoughts or not, and how much value we assign to them. We can ask ourselves whether or not our thoughts are connected to Jesus and the fruits of the spirit, or connected to anything that will lead to good for ourselves and good for whatever or whomever we're thinking about. Paul teaches the Corinthians and us to take our thoughts captive. Within Christianity, there is a clear emphasis on what we are to be thinking about and meditating on. As Christians we are free to point our focus on grace, truth, God's Word, whatever is righteous, pure, holy - all of that! We are free to choose to dwell on these things because of the freedom we have in Christ. Moreover, the hope of the Gospel tells us all good things will ultimately defeat and replace all things false, negative and evil.

I believe most anger grows in us based on what and how we are thinking. The book of James tells us to be quick to hear, slow to speak, and slow to anger. Jesus was faced with many opportunities to become angry when he was on trial for the crime of simply being who he was, the Son of God. Yet he chose not to resist, petition for himself or use his power to harm anyone (all things he easily could have done as also fully God). In fact, when Peter thought he was acting on Jesus' behalf by chopping off the ear of a high priest's servant, Jesus corrected Peter and reattached the servant's ear. However, we do see Jesus becoming angry at the sight of injustice or people taking advantage of the poor. We do see Jesus channel his anger in defense of others when it really mattered. If we are to follow Jesus, we should seek to channel our anger in this way also. Instead of letting resentment build up over time or letting anger permeate our thinking, which only leads to being an angry person; we should try to take captive every thought and make it obedient to Christ. Then our anger won't be misplaced, and it won't present itself as explosive, abusive or resentful. It will present itself as righteous and pointed in the direction and way of Jesus.

Committed to Christ

Last month, I shared that it is my hope to write regularly about the 5 C's (Committed to Christ, Engaged in Community, Transformed in Character, Fulfilling your Calling, and Developing your Competencies) or what we at F Street have adopted as the Description of a Discipled Person. Our hope is that this description will give you something great to strive for in terms of your personal spiritual growth.

The description of the first "5C" states this:

- Be Committed to Christ: Consistently demonstrates the following:
 - An authentic, growing relationship with Jesus Christ
 - A love for the Bible and a belief in the authority and historical reliability of Scripture
 - An ability and willingness to communicate the truths of the Bible in a practical and relevant way.

These are just a few ways that a committed relationship with Christ can be demonstrated. Jesus tells us, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me. (John 14:6)." It is through a relationship with Jesus that we get to know God and find our hope, our salvation from the sin and brokenness of this world. "And this is the way to have eternal life—to know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, the one you sent to earth (John 17:3)."

So why all the emphasis on the Bible? Well, John tells us: And we can be sure that we know him if we obey his commandments. If someone claims, "I know God," but doesn't obey God's commandments, that person is a liar and is not living in the truth. But those who obey God's word truly show how completely they love him. That is how we know we are living in him. Those who say they live in God should live their lives as Jesus did (1 John 2:3-6)."

This article is intended to encourage you to seek Jesus, to passionately pursue him, to chase him with all your love and life. It is our desire that as you get to know Jesus that you will long to obey Him simply because you love him.

So where and how do we grow in this relationship?

- Believe; acknowledge that God's Word is the authority for truth, not our culture or our own ideas and therefore Jesus is who he says he is and we can trust our lives to him.
- Read the Word; open your Bible to learn about who God is and what he wants for you and from you. Look for things to obey and promises to claim for your life. Put into practice what you are learning.
- Pray; take time to engage with Jesus. Like any relationship, take time to talk and to listen, take time to share the hurts and express your gratitude but also learn to slow down and listen.

One of the best passages on being committed to Christ is John 15, which states: "Remain in me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me (John 15:14)." I encourage you to reflect on this passage throughout the week and choose to make your relationship with Christ the priority in your life.
