I am currently receiving coaching from one of our coaches with TLC (Transformed Life Coaching). The first week she coached me, I sobbed through the conversation as I wrestled through a difficult friendship. By the end of the conversation, I had clarity about what I needed to do and felt like a weight had been lifted. The second week I spent my hour talking about another hard life situation, examining it from different vantage points and perspectives. Through coaching, I am working on various spiritual, financial, professional, and relational goals that will hopefully help me better follow Christ.

We all need to and want to grow in various aspects of life. Transformed Life Coaching is a ministry of F Street Church that offers coaching free-of-charge to members of our church and community. We have offices at 1037 S. 13th Street and can meet in-person or by zoom. We are available for individuals who may just want to meet one or two times to process something, or for individuals who may want to do a “coaching series” (ten to twelve sessions). Our coaches are trained to listen carefully, ask questions that lead to awareness, and help a person take steps to move forward.

At F Street Neighborhood Church, we view Church Membership as an important spiritual commitment, and we invite you to commit yourself to the following 5 Cs that provide a model of discipleship for us as a congregation. If you are new to F Street Neighborhood Church (or would like a refresher), please look over this list of Qualifications of a Church Member.

CHRIST

...Be Committed to Christ:

- An authentic, growing relationship with Jesus Christ that has been expressed in Christian baptism.
- A love for the Bible, a belief in the authority and historical reliability of Scripture, as well as the ability to affirm the faith outlined in the Apostles Creed.

COMMUNITY

...Be Engaged in Community:

- A commitment to F Street Neighborhood Church with demonstrated attendance and participation (giving and serving) for six months, as well as a willingness to live out the “one anothers” of Scripture (to love, serve, forgive, etc.).
- Accountability to and authenticity with other believers, including but not limited to, submitting to the authority of the church’s leadership.

CHARACTER

...Be Transformed in Character:

- A willingness to submit to the authority of Scripture in all areas of life, growing in Christ-like character.
- A life that reflects the fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control).

CALLING

...Be fulfilling your Calling:

- An understanding and sense of calling to ministry for the building up of the body.
- A passion to fulfill God’s calling within the tension of Grace and Truth.

COMPETENCY

...Be developing Competencies:

- A growing knowledge and willingness to use spiritual gifts and natural talents in the context of the local church.
- Teachability--an attitude of humility and willingness to grow and learn.

- Water bottles




The Spiritual Disciplines: Service

Luke 9:46-48 says, “Then his disciples began arguing about which of them was the greatest. But Jesus knew their thoughts, so he brought a little child to his side. Then he said to them, “Anyone who welcomes a little child like this on my behalf welcomes me, and anyone who welcomes me also welcomes my Father who sent me. Whoever is the least among you is the greatest.” There, from Jesus, we get a clear picture of service and submission to others. Also, it’s clear as it pertains to how Christ’s Kingdom works and how different it is to the kingdoms we build. The problem for me has always been knowing I’m not the greatest but also having a strong desire to not be the least either. I’ve even asked God to make me greater, not understanding this was the wrong question altogether. When Jesus washed his disciples’ feet, foot-washing was to be done exclusively by the least. The lowest, the slaves in their households. Imagine the disciples gathered for the Passover feast, all knowing that someone needed to wash the others’ feet, but not a single one of them wanting to be considered the least. Maybe they even sat there awkwardly waiting for one of the others to do it, because while they knew it had to be done, not a single one of them wanted it to be them who did it. Then, shockingly, it was Jesus who took the initiative and began washing their feet. The gospel of John tells us Peter protested and told Jesus “you will never ever wash my feet.” But to that Jesus responded, “If I do not wash you, you have no share with me” (John 13:8). Then, after Jesus finished washing their feet this is what he said to them: “You call me ‘Teacher’ and ‘Lord,’ and you are right, because that’s what I am. And since I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash each other’s feet. I have given you an example to follow. Do as I have done to you” (John 13:13-15).

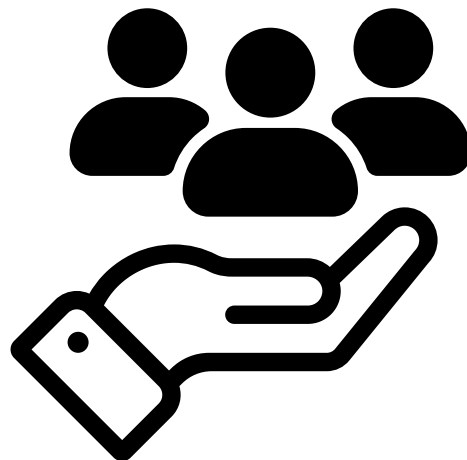
Jesus obliterated the need for some kind of power struggle amongst them. He made it clear to them, because of how great He was to them, that the greatest man they knew was not above doing the lowest of tasks. Then Jesus doubled down and told them to do the same. Just because the concept of service is easy to understand doesn’t mean it’s easily applied. We all have a strong desire to be considered great. Some of us so strongly desire recognition from others and high status in society, we will do almost anything to attain it. This is partially why narcissism exists, and why people lie or manipulate to build themselves up. This is also partly why people work so hard to prove to others they have value. But Jesus says, you already have value, because my Father in heaven made you. So, the best way you can show your value is to serve others out of love and sacrifice for me and for them. In his chapter on the discipline of service, Richard Foster makes an important distinction between “self-righteous service” and “true service.” He says, “Self-righteous service is impressed with the ‘big deal.’ It is concerned to make impressive gains on ecclesiastical scoreboards...True service almost finds it impossible to distinguish the small from the large service.” The self-righteous kind may pick and choose, strategically, who it serves for its own benefit, whereas true servants have heard the command of Jesus to be servants of all, in Mark 9:35. I too think that’s an important distinction, but would add service is service. So let our service, however great or small, be done unto The Lord and not ourselves.

Practicing the discipline of service is a great way to grow humility as a Christ-follower. When you serve others, it's about everything except you. You are considering others as greater than yourself, and because of that your focus becomes outward-facing and humble. So, if humility is something that has always seemed to elude you, instead of trying to become humbler, with intention, place an act of service in your week. Maybe even ask God to guide you to someone you can serve today. Richard Foster says, "Nothing disciplines the inordinate desires of the flesh like service, and nothing transforms the desires of the flesh like serving in hiddenness." Meaning, service with no strings attached, simply changes a person. It will make you more Christ-like, because everything Christ did was about others. When James and John asked Jesus if they could sit in places of honor next to him on his glorious throne, Jesus used it as an opportunity to teach them about service and ended by saying, "For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve others and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45). God's Kingdom is not about our power. Here, some of you might be thinking, "yes, but if I do that, won't I get taken advantage of?" The short answer is yes, you might sometimes. However, do you think Jesus was taken advantage of? Have we, ourselves, not taken advantage of him? Moreover, the advantage that was taken of Jesus also led to him ruling at the right hand of God, The Father. I'm not meaning to say we should sin for others or drop all of our healthy boundaries. I am saying what Jesus said in the sermon on the mount, "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, Do not resist the one who is evil. But if anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also. And if anyone would sue you and take your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles. Give to the one who begs from you, and do not refuse the one who would borrow from you" (Matthew 5:38-42). When we know and truly understand who Jesus is, we will also understand what being a true servant is.



Finding Joy in the Reading of Scripture

Have you ever picked up your Bible, read a few verses, and thought, "What the heck did I just read?" You're not alone. I think we all agree with the Apostle Peter when he said that some of Paul's writings were "hard to understand" (2 Peter 3:16). But what if reading Scripture could become less of a chore and more of a conversation with God?

Sacred Reading (or Lectio Divina) is an ancient practice that transforms Bible reading from simply gathering information to an encounter with Jesus. Rather than approaching Scripture as another item we are supposed to do, this simple method helps us slow down, listen, and allow God's Word to speak directly to us and actually apply it to our lives.

My favorite theologian, Martin Luther, once wrote that the text of Scripture is like "the swaddling-clothes in which Christ lies." Through Sacred Reading, we find the living Christ there in words on the page.

Beginning the Sunday after Easter (April 27th) at 5:30pm, I'll be leading a course on "A Simple Way to Read and Pray" where we'll explore this life-giving approach together. I invite you to join us as we discover how to move beyond the pages and text to encounter the Living God revealed in Jesus Christ.

When F Street started almost 11 years ago, we quickly began hosting block parties on Saturdays with the goal of connecting with our neighbors. We've always wanted to bless and get to know the people around us, believing that God has called us to this neighborhood for that very reason.

Over the years, we moved the parties to the last Sunday of the month during the summer to involve more people from church and connect them to our Sunday gathering. Then around 2020, we transitioned to year-round block parties—and more recently, we began having sponsors help carry the cost.

Today, I (Pastor Jeff) am leading our block parties alongside Terry Martinez, and we're hoping to continue building on the momentum. Every person who has led the Block Party Team has made improvements and done a great job. My goal is to see our block parties continue to grow as a space where we display the Kingdom of God—where people feel like they belong, are well-fed, enjoy community, music, activities, and just have fun.

I'd love to see us add even more activities—especially once we move back outside in May—along with more opportunities for people to connect through an information tent, prayer tent, community partner tent, and an activities tent. Thanks to a small grant from our denomination, we've already purchased four new tents and will be getting additional tables and chairs. We also hope to bring in more music, possibly even live performances.

Imagine if people who don't know Jesus got to experience a glimpse of God's Kingdom here on earth. Imagine how these gatherings could open the door to sharing the hope we've found in Him.

That said, I want to be honest—these are my hopes, and I'm asking for help to make them a reality. Whether it's staying after church for as many block parties as possible, signing up to serve, or hosting the information table, this will take more people getting involved to make it happen.

The book’s message can be summed up like this:

- “God created us to live with a single passion—to joyfully display His supreme excellence in all areas of life. The wasted life is one without this passion. God calls us to pray, think, dream, plan, and work—not to be made much of, but to make much of Him in every part of our lives.”

It’s a lie to believe God saved us just so we could go to heaven someday. The call for believers is not to simply sit in church but to “GO” (Matthew 28:19)—to actively live in the world as representatives of His glory, inviting others to know Him.

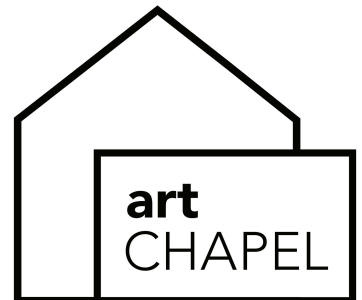
So, are you wasting your life chasing the things of this world? Or are you living with a passion for God, showing others who He is because of what He’s already done for you?

Dear friends,

Michelle is currently serving in the selection process for the very competitive President's Leadership Scholarship. While reading the student essays, we are deeply reminded of the significant feats and challenges many of our students overcome simply to get to this university. Feats that build resilience, determination, and sharpen leadership potential.

Here are some examples. As you read them, please pray for our students:

- Olivia* from occupied Ukraine wrote: When we learned that the Russian soldiers were coming to our house in a raid, my father said to me, "No matter what happens, even if they kill me or your mother, or take me away, you will have to get behind the wheel and drive [the 150 km] to get yourself across the 'new' Ukrainian border." She was 15 at the time.
- Kate's* mom died when she was 17 years old. She wrote, "From that moment I was completely alone. I had no financial or emotional support from anyone. In the past 3 years I have learned independence, perseverance, and the importance of hard work."
- Lily* was an orphan in her own house but later taken in and adopted by a missionary family. She spent more than 2 years processing and finding freedom from many prior traumas. She demonstrates incredible resilience working through and pursuing higher education despite these challenges.

These are just a few stories of courage, loss, dreams shattered and hope re-found. They are true stories of God's hand guiding these individuals here.

Please pray:

- For students like these as they engage in their studies despite the hurdles they crossed to get here.
- That our students would see God's hand bringing them here. And that they might find ultimate freedom here.
- For prospective students: that God would bring those here who need to hear of the freedom and hope that he provides.
- For wisdom in the scholarship decisions.
