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What lies beneath the surface?

This month I wanted to write about Competencies as part of highlighting one of the 5 Cs. In preparing, I did a quick Google search and discovered that one of the most common illustrations for competencies is an iceberg. The point is simple: we often only see part of our competencies—our visible gifts and abilities—while many more remain beneath the surface. Some are yet to be developed, and others are not yet known to us or those around us.

By this illustration, there is more in each of us that God desires to use for the building of His kingdom. Too often we have allowed only a portion of our God-given gifts and abilities to be seen or to become useful toward this goal.

Recently, I had a conversation with someone who shared a passion and a skill that I had no idea they possessed—something they are uniquely wired for and even feel called to do for God. At the same time, it was clear that God had been developing that very area of ministry here at F Street. I realized He had already provided the perfect person for this opportunity.

As I look around F Street, I see so many opportunities to serve in ways that help us be the place of acceptance and direction God has called us to be in the neighborhood. There are new ministries yet to be explored or started (and if you didn't know, I'm passionate about starting new things!). There are also so many people who have only begun to reveal their full potential to the church and for the Kingdom of God.

I want to encourage you to consider two ways to discover more about how God has wired you and how you can get involved here at F Street:

- <u>SHAPE Packet</u>. This simple packet can be picked up at the office, or you can contact Hollie at hollie@fstreetchurch.org—or catch her or me (Jeff) on a Sunday morning. Fill it out at home, and then we'll set up a meeting to help you process your Spiritual gifts, Heart, Abilities, Passions, and Experiences and get plugged in.
- <u>Join an F Street Ministry Team.</u> At the welcome table in the back of the church you'll find a "Team Ministry" form. Fill it out with the teams you're interested in, and we'll work to get you connected with one of our current teams serving the body here at F Street.

God has gifted you to be used for ministry. Let's see what He can do through all of us working together for Him.


Come to Jesus in Prayer

A Radical Love for Hurting People

As I think about raising up future church planters, pastors, and leaders—with the hope that F Street will plant more churches in often-overlooked neighborhoods—I am looking for more than just people who are theologically sound or of good character. I am looking for people who love the hurting, the broken, the addicted, and the wounded. Sadly, this is becoming an ever-growing challenge.

Today, it's possible to be "theologically sound" and yet fail to show compassion or love toward those who are hurting, who think differently, or who do not believe the Bible as truth. Biblically, this is impossible. After all, the greatest commandment is to love the Lord your God and to love your neighbor as yourself, and God Himself is love. Yet too often theological correctness gets twisted into rudeness, even hostility, toward those who disagree with us or live differently than we do.

Jesus, on the other hand, was criticized by the theologically sound of His time (the Pharisees) because He spent time with tax collectors and sinners (Luke 15:1–2). Think about that: He sat at the table, eating and interacting with tax collectors—people despised for exploiting their own people for profit. Jesus showed grace to the woman caught in adultery, welcomed children, received the anointing of a prostitute, healed beggars, and forgave thieves. And ultimately, He died so that you and I might receive the forgiveness of sins.

At F Street, we want to cultivate that same radical love—a love willing to embrace those in need, welcome the lost, eat with those who think differently than we do, reach out to those who may be up to no good, and forgive those who have hurt us. We want to know the Word of God and live like Jesus, with compassion for others.

May we be called out—not just by God, but also by others—for sitting at the table with those whom Jesus Himself would sit with.

The hope behind this ministry is that 1) the absent parent will be able to give a gift to their child or children for Christmas and 2) most importantly, the family will have a connection with our church and ultimately Jesus, for their parent to come back home to.

The Heart of Hospitality

I was recently welcomed into a home that contained only a desk, an inflatable bed, and a dining room table. There were no wall hangings, yet the hospitality was exceptional. We were greeted warmly, given a tour of the home, offered something to drink, and treated to a homemade meal with tea and dessert.

I was struck again by how hospitality isn't about the things we own or the space we offer, but about the heart behind it—the heart to welcome and engage with others.

The Bible makes it clear that hospitality should be a mark of the church, and specifically of the people who make up the church. Scripture says:

- "The end of the world is coming soon... Cheerfully share your home with those who need a meal or a place to stay." (1 Peter 4:7, 9)
- And of leaders: "He must enjoy having guests in his home." (1 Timothy 3:2)

Too often, we evaluate whether others are hospitable to us. But the Bible calls us not to judge others, but to be hospitable ourselves.

So how could you be hospitable? Here are a few thoughts:

- Pray and ask God who you might connect with.
- Make a goal to invite someone (or a group) over—or out—for dinner or coffee.
- Stay alert to who might need an invitation; praying and planning doesn't rule out being spontaneous.
- Don't assume someone is "too busy," or that busyness means they are relationally connected.
- Remember: hospitality isn't about location or things, but about attitude.
- Learn to be curious about others—ask about their family, activities, past, or dreams.

I hope you'll take time to consider how you might practice hospitality.

Missionary Corner

9/14/25 - The Howells

Dear friends,

We take for granted that we can worship freely in Lithuania, read the Bible with our family, and work at a university where we can tell <u>young people</u> about Jesus. However, the reality is that churches and universities are not necessarily safe anywhere around the world. We cannot shrink back or take safety for granted.

Charlie Kirk's assassination last week left us grieving for his family (with children of similar ages to ours) and reflecting on the importance of <u>our work with university students</u>. The assassination happened on a college campus. "Teach us to number our days aright." (Psalm 90:12).

Meanwhile, a colleague's <u>teen</u> has been struggling to know who he is and to find his place in the world. Some of his actions are causing the parents to readjust their careers in Lithuania. Many <u>young people</u>, asking similar <u>questions of identity and purpose</u>, turn to a social world online . . . and though they find many spaces to share (or brood on) their questions and ideas, technology really offers a dark, lonely world. The internet is a dangerous escape for a <u>lonely generation</u>. No matter the views, technology amplifies the worst voices and is leading many people down dangerous paths. There is a serious ongoing <u>spiritual battle</u> for <u>young people</u>.

Then on Friday, I (Michelle) left our church's youth group with a heavy but grateful heart. Heavy because the <u>teenage years</u> are hard, and the <u>effects of sin</u> make them harder! And grateful for the <u>privilege to speak hope</u> to these <u>beautiful young ladies</u>. This week, I shared the following from one of my dad's books, "Sin destroys _____, but where Christ is king, there is redemption." We filled in the blank with many relevant spheres, shared examples of sins' destructive effects, and then brainstormed examples in those spheres of hope and good.

Young people yearn to know they are significant, have a place in the world, and have a voice. At LCC International University and in Klaipeda, we have the opportunity to speak truth into many young people at critical times in their lives. We get to remind them that God made them; he made them in his image; he didn't mess up in making them; he made them with a unique and special plan for their lives; they matter to him; and they matter to the world.

Thank you for sending us, praying for us, and supporting our work in Lithuania. We cannot afford to be complacent, but need to count the cost, speak boldly the words of life in a dying world. This is bigger than LCC, but it gives us a renewed focus and reminder in our daily work here. While we recognize the importance of this work, we know that anything we do is only possible through the transformative work of the Holy Spirit. Now, more than ever, we need the Spirit to move.
