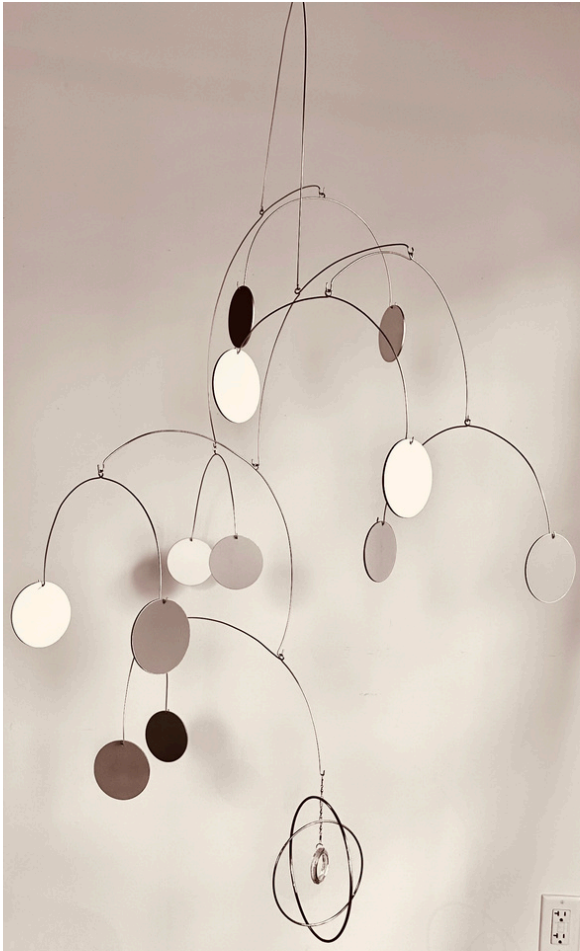

Ephesians Art

Over the next few months, the preaching here at F Street will be titled “In Christ” and drawn from the book of Ephesians. It will touch on themes of identity, relationships, and doing spiritual battle.

To help spotlight those concepts, we’re displaying a mobile above the altar. It’s made up of a crystal surrounded by gold rings and some smaller painted wooden circles, all suspended and linked together by curved gold wires.

The crystal encircled by two gold rings is the heaviest part of the mobile and is situated at the bottom to anchor all the other pieces, keeping them balanced and suspended. This is a reflection of Jesus at work in our lives. He is our foundation, and our true identity is given to us by him. He sustains us; “in him we live and move

and have our being” (Acts 17:28). Just as the mobile would collapse without that anchor piece, God continually sustains us.

The smaller circles are painted white on one side and a variety of colors on the other side. They each have a gold rim. The white reminds us that when we surrender to Jesus, he purifies us from our sins. The color speaks of the reality that though we are redeemed, we live in a fallen, not pure world. The gold rim tells the glorious truth that when Jesus saves us, we are forever secure in him. He is our protector who won our salvation and does battle for us daily as we walk this earth.

All of the pieces of the mobile move through space, interacting with each other as the air flows around them. They’re individual but connected. This is a picture of the Church; we’re individual people connected by our mutual commitment to Jesus, each a necessary part of the whole. If a single piece is removed from the mobile, the whole structure is thrown out of balance, and its beauty and effectiveness are diminished. In the same way, each of us is a vital member of the F Street family.

Reconstituting the Mission Team

Earlier this year, I agreed to take on the role of team leader for the Mission Team. For me, there is no greater calling than to carry out Jesus Christ's last command to His disciples: "Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit." As I work with Pastor Jeff to identify others who have a heart for mission work to serve on the team, I'm impressed with just how active F Street Neighborhood Church is in supporting the mission field. One of the roles of the newly constituted mission team will be to develop criteria in order to select missions on an annual basis for church support, as well as to identify other missions to showcase for the church congregation.

Compassion Begins with Our Eyes

Compassion is something we look for in others and hope to offer ourselves. Biblically, compassion is more than feeling sorry for someone. It is a deep, visceral, and actionable sympathy for another's suffering, rooted in the character of God.

Throughout the Gospels, we read that Jesus was moved with compassion. And when Jesus was moved, he acted.

- He healed the sick.
- He fed the hungry.
- He taught the wandering.
- He even raised the dead.

Compassion moved Jesus toward people, not away from them.

Jesus also taught the importance of compassion in the story of the Good Samaritan. One insight from that story is this: Compassion has everything to do with sight.

How we see people shapes how we respond to them. Think about the different ways people "saw" the wounded man:

- The robbers saw a victim to attack.
- The priest saw someone to avoid.
- The temple worker saw someone walking around.
- The lawyer saw his situation as a problem to fix.
- The innkeeper may have seen a customer.
- But the Good Samaritan saw a neighbor to serve.

And because he saw a neighbor, he was moved with compassion and served.

Not all the other responses were overtly evil, but they all failed in one way: they did not truly see the wounded man as a person to love.

That raises a question for us: How do you see people?

- Do you see interruptions... or neighbors?
- Do you see burdens... or people bearing burdens to carry?
- Do you see problems to solve... or people to serve?

Are there specific people you tend to view in a limited way—through labels, assumptions, differences, inconvenience, or past hurts—rather than as neighbors? What might change if you began seeing people the way Jesus does?

Paul writes in **Philippians 2:3–4**: *"Don't be selfish; don't try to impress others. Be humble, thinking of others as better than yourselves. Don't look out only for your own interests, but take an interest in others, too."*

The Overflow of Love: Nurturing the Table

Our Block Parties flow from one simple vision: ***Nurturing a table of unconditional acceptance and shared direction, rooted in love***—a place where everyone knows they belong. When we talk about serving our neighborhood, it's helpful to remember how often Jesus chose the table. Again and again, He sat with people others overlooked or avoided. He shared meals with those who weren't expected, welcomed, or even understood. And in those moments, people experienced something unexpected—not judgment but belonging. The table wasn't just about food. It was about presence, connection, and making space for people to be seen and known. When we look at that picture, it reframes how we think about service. Here's the shift for us: we don't serve because we're "supposed to," or out of obligation. We serve because we get to. It's a chance to be the hands and feet of Jesus—a movement from duty to delight. Our service becomes gratitude in action, a way of saying "thank you" for the grace we've already received. It's a privilege to join what God is doing, turning our focus outward toward others.

This past month, we saw that spirit of delight on full display. To everyone who prepared and served meals—and to the many others who faithfully served in different ways, thank you. Whether you were cooking, setting up, tearing down, or simply offering a warm welcome, every act mattered. Together, you gave us a picture of God's Kingdom—where the focus isn't on recognition, but on the love behind the gift. Your behind-the-scenes service made something powerful visible: a community marked by presence, generosity, and love.

We also had an exciting first this month—moving Creative Fun into the Art Chapel. And honestly, it was something special. The Art Chapel has become a small sanctuary in the heart of the neighborhood, a place to gather, create, and simply be. It's been incredible to watch people explore, connect, and find moments of peace and expression. If you missed it, we'd love for you to join us next time. We're excited to see this continue to grow into something meaningful for our community.

We believe God has placed something unique in each person—and often, we discover it as we step in and serve alongside one another. Each month, that takes shape around something simple: a shared meal. But what happens here is more than food—it's people preparing, welcoming, listening, and caring for one another. As we continue nurturing this table of belonging, there's room for more people to step in—not just as volunteers, but as part of the life of this community. We're especially looking for a few "Mighty Warriors"—people who feel drawn to show up with intention, care, and consistency. That can look different for everyone:

Before the table

Helping prepare meals, setting up, praying over, and creating an environment that feels warm and ready.

At the table

Greeting guests, serving with joy, sitting with people, and building real connections.

Beyond the table

Praying with others, following up, or simply continuing relationships throughout the week.

Whether you're someone who loves being behind the scenes or someone who comes alive in conversation, there's a place for you here. There's no pressure—just an open invitation. Immerse

United Church of Christ Philippines (Prison Ministry).

Last October, I provided information to the F Street Neighborhood Church about the United Church of Christ's prison ministry in Leyte, Philippines. The United Church of Christ is a major mainline Protestant denomination practiced across the archipelago. Pastors from member churches are the front line for visiting jails across Leyte to preach God's Word and to provide Bibles and other necessities. Some of these ordained pastors were once incarcerated themselves, or have family members who are or were incarcerated.

I also discussed my work with one of the member churches, the Mahalit Church of Christ in Ormoc City, Leyte, to begin distributing Bibles to incarcerated individuals in six jails across various cities. These six facilities house around 500 male and female inmates, who are held in sub-standard conditions, with insufficient food, water, and medical care. Some are incarcerated for very minor offenses and are often kept past their sentencing dates, due to their insufficient funds to pay processing fees.

During my October and March trips, we distributed 300 Bibles, towels, soap, toothbrushes, and toothpaste to inmates in these jails. We also held church services and baptized new believers. The pastor of the Mahalit Church of Christ estimates that \$424 monthly is needed to consistently provide Bibles, reading glasses, towels, soap, toothbrushes, and toothpaste to jailed inmates. This estimate includes the purchase of Bibles and other necessities, as well as fuel for the motorcycles and vehicles to travel to the various cities where jails are located.

Running Naked

Hebrews 12:1–2 says:

“Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a huge crowd of witnesses to the life of faith, let us strip off every weight that slows us down, especially the sin that so easily trips us up. And let us run with endurance the race God has set before us. We do this by keeping our eyes on Jesus, the champion who initiates and perfects our faith.”

The call to strip off everything that slows us down is a real challenge. If I’m honest, I love many of the things this world offers, things that bring comfort, security, and pleasure. Yet often those very things can hinder me from following Jesus fully. But notice: the Christian life is not simply about letting go of things. It is about letting go of something greater. We strip off what weighs us down so that we can run for the prize, Jesus himself.

In 2003, I ran the Chicago Marathon, and I’ll never forget the sight when the gun sounded at the start of the race. On that brisk October morning, runners began throwing off sweatshirts, sweatpants, stocking caps, fanny packs, water bottles, and anything extra. No one wanted to carry unnecessary weight that might hinder them from finishing the race.

In that moment, holding on to that North Face sweatshirt wasn’t as important as finishing the race.

That is the image Hebrews gives us. There are things we hold onto that may not seem sinful in themselves, but they are weighing us down. Comfort. Distraction. Regret. Fear. Unforgiveness. Ambition. Even good things can become hindrances when they keep us from the wholehearted pursuit of Christ.

Paul echoes this in Philippians 3:13–14: *“But I focus on this one thing: Forgetting the past and looking forward to what lies ahead, I press on to reach the end of the race and receive the heavenly prize for which God, through Christ Jesus, is calling us.”*

What things are you needing to let go of to complete the race? What things might be tripping you up?

Think Smaller...

Some of us think big, and that's great! I actually tend to think big and dream big, but then I often feel discouraged when my big ideas and dreams don't work out quite like I wanted them to. Throughout the last several years, God has been placing it upon my heart to think smaller. I am reminded of God's Kingdom described as a mustard seed and other similar teachings of Jesus. As in Luke 16, where Jesus, via parable, urges his followers to be as shrewd about securing spiritual, eternal treasures as worldly people are about securing earthly wealth. In Luke 16:9-10 (NLT), Jesus says,

Here's the lesson: Use your worldly resources to benefit others and make friends. Then, when your possessions are gone, they will welcome you to an eternal home. "If you are faithful in little things, you will be faithful in large ones. But if you are dishonest in little things, you won't be honest with greater responsibilities.

Jesus is certainly challenging and correcting the Pharisees, whom Luke says "dearly love" their money (Luke 16:14, NLT), but he's also saying something about the way we tend to think as human beings that is important and insightful. Some of us tend to want to wait to be faithful with the gifts God has given us until the timing is perfect in our eyes, or until our idea is grand enough that it is sure to impress. Or maybe we think of the gifts God gives us as ways to serve our purposes rather than his. This is worldly thinking, and not what God has in mind. God tells us to be faithful in everything, including the little things. Luke 16 tells us this is how we show the Lord and those around us that we can be trusted and will be honest with greater responsibilities. All of us have gifts we can offer to our Church community, our neighborhoods, and to those around us. If there's any idea you've thought about starting, but don't feel you can do it, or maybe you feel like it's too big to follow through with. Let this be an encouragement to you to think about what you can be faithful with right now. Maybe try thinking smaller, then pray and trust your Heavenly Father that he is honest and faithful in all things.

I (Kim) have never considered myself to be a very strong or creative writer, but I often find writing to be somewhat therapeutic, or at least clarifying, for me. Issues that I've struggled with, sadness that I've wanted to share, hope and joy found in difficult places are easier to express on paper (or a computer screen) than in "real life." This update, however, has been particularly difficult to set to words - so much so that I find myself breaking my own self-imposed rule of having our update ready by the morning on the first of the month.

Our organization, Serge, recommends that individuals and families in cross-cultural missions take twelve months out of every five years on Home Assignment. Our family doesn't do transitions exceptionally well, so we settled on doing the whole twelve months in one shot. Which means that in late July, we'll be traveling back to the US to begin twelve months of "Home Assignment" - a year of Sabbatical, visiting family, friends, and supporters, "brick and mortar" school for Dominic, and whatever else God has in store for us for the year.

So again, why the delay in sharing this news? Part of it is that we're still adjusting to the idea of Home Assignment. We're looking forward to being in the US for a time, but there's also a lot we're going to miss about Kapsowar and our community, and a lot of sadness about departing from our work here for such a prolonged period. We're hoping to get to visit with many of you during our time in North America, so please look for future updates through this newsletter or our blog, as we figure out the logistics!
